

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTORNEYS COMPLETING CIVIL COVER SHEET FORM JS 44

Authority For Civil Cover Sheet

The JS 44 civil cover sheet and the information contained herein neither replaces nor supplements the filings and service of pleading or other papers as required by law, except as provided by local rules of court. This form, approved by the Judicial Conference of the United States in September 1974, is required for the use of the Clerk of Court for the purpose of initiating the civil docket sheet. Consequently, a civil cover sheet is submitted to the Clerk of Court for each civil complaint filed. The attorney filing a case should complete the form as follows:

- I.(a) Plaintiffs-Defendants.** Enter names (last, first, middle initial) of plaintiff and defendant. If the plaintiff or defendant is a government agency, use only the full name or standard abbreviations. If the plaintiff or defendant is an official within a government agency, identify first the agency and then the official, giving both name and title.
- (b) County of Residence.** For each civil case filed, except U.S. plaintiff cases, enter the name of the county where the first listed plaintiff resides at the time of filing. In U.S. plaintiff cases, enter the name of the county in which the first listed defendant resides at the time of filing. (NOTE: In land condemnation cases, the county of residence of the "defendant" is the location of the tract of land involved.)
- (c) Attorneys.** Enter the firm name, address, telephone number, and attorney of record. If there are several attorneys, list them on an attachment, noting in this section "(see attachment)".
- II. Jurisdiction.** The basis of jurisdiction is set forth under Rule 8(a), F.R.Cv.P., which requires that jurisdictions be shown in pleadings. Place an "X" in one of the boxes. If there is more than one basis of jurisdiction, precedence is given in the order shown below.
 United States plaintiff. (1) Jurisdiction based on 28 U.S.C. 1345 and 1348. Suits by agencies and officers of the United States are included here.
 United States defendant. (2) When the plaintiff is suing the United States, its officers or agencies, place an "X" in this box.
 Federal question. (3) This refers to suits under 28 U.S.C. 1331, where jurisdiction arises under the Constitution of the United States, an amendment to the Constitution, an act of Congress or a treaty of the United States. In cases where the U.S. is a party, the U.S. plaintiff or defendant code takes precedence, and box 1 or 2 should be marked.

 Remanded from Appellate Court. (3) Check this box for cases remanded to the district court for further action. Use the date of remand as the filing date.
 Reinstated or Reopened. (4) Check this box for cases reinstated or reopened in the district court. Use the reopening date as the filing date.
 Transferred from Another District. (5) For cases transferred under Title 28 U.S.C. Section 1404(a). Do not use this for within district transfers or multidistrict litigation transfers.
 Multidistrict Litigation – Transfer. (6) Check this box when a multidistrict case is transferred into the district under authority of Title 28 U.S.C. Section 1407.
 Multidistrict Litigation – Direct File. (8) Check this box when a multidistrict case is filed in the same district as the Master MDL docket.
PLEASE NOTE THAT THERE IS NOT AN ORIGIN CODE 7. Origin Code 7 was used for historical records and is no longer relevant due to changes in statute.
- VI. Cause of Action.** Report the civil statute directly related to the cause of action and give a brief description of the cause. **Do not cite jurisdictional statutes unless diversity.** Example: U.S. Civil Statute: 47 USC 553 Brief Description: Unauthorized reception of cable service.
- VII. Requested in Complaint.** Class Action. Place an "X" in this box if you are filing a class action under Rule 23, F.R.Cv.P.
 Demand. In this space enter the actual dollar amount being demanded or indicate other demand, such as a preliminary injunction.
 Jury Demand. Check the appropriate box to indicate whether or not a jury is being demanded.
- VIII. Related Cases.** This section of the JS 44 is used to reference related pending cases, if any. If there are related pending cases, insert the docket numbers and the corresponding judge names for such cases.

Instructions

1. **Who Should Use This Form.** You should use this form if
 - you are a federal prisoner and you wish to challenge the way your sentence is being carried out (*for example, you claim that the Bureau of Prisons miscalculated your sentence or failed to properly award good time credits*);
 - you are in federal or state custody because of something other than a judgment of conviction (*for example, you are in pretrial detention or are awaiting extradition*); or
 - you are alleging that you are illegally detained in immigration custody.
2. **Who Should Not Use This Form.** You should not use this form if
 - you are challenging the validity of a federal judgment of conviction and sentence (*these challenges are generally raised in a motion under 28 U.S.C. § 2255*);
 - you are challenging the validity of a state judgment of conviction and sentence (*these challenges are generally raised in a petition under 28 U.S.C. § 2254*); or
 - you are challenging a final order of removal in an immigration case (*these challenges are generally raised in a petition for review directly with a United States Court of Appeals*).
3. **Preparing the Petition.** The petition must be typed or neatly written, and you must sign and date it under penalty of perjury. **A false statement may lead to prosecution.**
4. **Answer all the questions.** You do not need to cite law. You may submit additional pages if necessary. If you do not fill out the form properly, you will be asked to submit additional or correct information. If you want to submit any legal arguments, you must submit them in a separate memorandum. Be aware that any such memorandum may be subject to page limits set forth in the local rules of the court where you file this petition. If you attach additional pages, number the pages and identify which section of the petition is being continued. All filings must be submitted on paper sized 8½ by 11 inches. **Do not use the back of any page.**
5. **Supporting Documents.** In addition to your petition, you must send to the court a copy of the decisions you are challenging and a copy of any briefs or administrative remedy forms filed in your case.
6. **Required Filing Fee.** You must include the \$5 filing fee required by 28 U.S.C. § 1914(a). If you are unable to pay the filing fee, you must ask the court for permission to proceed in forma pauperis – that is, as a person who cannot pay the filing fee – by submitting the documents that the court requires.
7. **Submitting Documents to the Court.** Mail your petition and _____ copies to the clerk of the United States District Court for the district and division in which you are confined. For a list of districts and divisions, see 28 U.S.C. §§ 81-131. All copies must be identical to the original. Copies may be legibly handwritten.

If you want a file-stamped copy of the petition, you must enclose an additional copy of the petition and ask the court to file-stamp it and return it to you.
8. **Change of Address.** You must immediately notify the court in writing of any change of address. If you do not, the court may dismiss your case.

Grounds for Your Challenge in This Petition

13. State every ground (reason) that supports your claim that you are being held in violation of the Constitution, laws, or treaties of the United States. GROUND ONE: Petitioner's continued detention for approximately 23 months without a constitutionally adequate bond hearing violates the Due Process Clause of the Fifth Amendment.

(a) Supporting facts (*Be brief. Do not cite cases or law.*):

Petitioner has been continuously detained by ICE for approximately 23 months while awaiting the outcome of his withholding-only proceeding before the Board of Immigration Appeals ("BIA"). Petitioner has received no adequate bond hearing since his initial detention, despite having minimal criminal history—a single conviction for simple marijuana possession (4th degree) in 2009—and having a U.S. citizen fiancée willing and able to sponsor and support him upon release. Petitioner poses no danger to the community and is not a flight risk.

(b) Did you present Ground One in all appeals that were available to you?

GROUND TWO: Petitioner's prolonged detention violates statutory limits on reasonable detention periods under immigration law.

(a) Supporting facts (*Be brief. Do not cite cases or law.*):

Petitioner's current detention significantly exceeds any reasonable or statutory limitation on immigration detention. Petitioner has remained in custody well beyond the period reasonably necessary to complete administrative immigration proceedings. There is no clear timeline for his case to conclude. Further, Petitioner's criminal history does not justify such prolonged incarceration, particularly given his stable family and community support.

(b) Did you present Ground Two in all appeals that were available to you?

GROUND THREE: Petitioner's prolonged detention without meaningful periodic review violates the Eighth Amendment's prohibition against excessive bail and cruel and unusual punishment.

(a) Supporting facts (*Be brief. Do not cite cases or law.*):

Petitioner has remained detained by ICE for nearly two years, far exceeding a reasonable period. During this time, he has not received periodic, meaningful custody reviews capable of adequately reassessing his circumstances. Petitioner's detention is effectively indefinite, excessive, and punitive, especially given the minor nature of his single criminal conviction from 2009 and the strong familial support available from his USC fiancée.

(b) Did you present Ground Three in all appeals that were available to you?

GROUND FOUR: Petitioner's prolonged detention is arbitrary and not reasonably related to its stated purpose of ensuring attendance at immigration proceedings or protecting community safety.

(a) Supporting facts (*Be brief. Do not cite cases or law.*):

Petitioner's nearly 23-month detention is arbitrary as it fails to serve any legitimate immigration enforcement goal. Petitioner's minor criminal history (a single, nonviolent marijuana-related offense from 2009), his stable relationship with a U.S. citizen fiancée, and his lack of any subsequent criminal activity demonstrate that detention does not protect public safety nor ensure his appearance at future immigration proceedings. Petitioner's continued detention thus lacks legitimate governmental justification.

If there are any grounds that you did not present in all appeals that were available to you, explain why you did not: Petitioner's prolonged detention constitutes a violation of equal protection under the Fifth Amendment as similarly situated individuals with comparable or more serious criminal records have routinely been afforded meaningful bond hearings or released from detention. Petitioner's treatment thus reflects inconsistent application of standards, raising serious equal protection concerns.

The benefits of having me as a sponsor are that I have a few friends that have their own business and will to help him with a job. I can certify that he is not a danger to society and that he adds great value to the community with his nurturing personality and hard work mentality.

I, Blennie Kelly, promise to provide Damion Scott with a stable home at [REDACTED] I will also provide transportation so that he attends all the immigration proceedings. If any financial assistance is require I will be able to help with that as well. He doesn't want to flee and hide. He wants to fight for this case and for the ability to enjoy the freedoms of the United States.

Therefore, I respectfully ask that you allow my friend, Damion Scott, to be granted the opportunity to continue his immigration case with me and my family.
