**Re: Cabrera Martinez v. Marich, et al.
25-CV-01110-LJV**

Dear Judge Vilardo:

Submitted herewith please find documents provided to me by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. Specifically, submitted herewith are a notice advising Martinez that he is "authorized to travel to the United States under the Nicaraguan parole process to seek parole", a Form I-94, Arrival/Departure Record showing that Martinez's class of admission is "NHP"¹ and he is authorized to remain in the United States through March 1, 2025, and, lastly, a Termination of Parole notice and Notice of Intent to Revoke Parole-Based Employment Authorization dated March 29, 2025. The Termination Notice specifically notes that at the termination of Martinez's parole (which occurred on March 1, 2025), he could be subject to expedited removal under Immigration and Nationality Act ("INA") § 235, 8 U.S.C. § 1225 or removal proceedings under INA § 240, 8 U.S.C. § 1229a.

The Parole Process for Nicaraguans is intended to enhance border security by reducing the number of Nicaraguan nationals entering the United States between ports of entry, and allowing instead a lawful process by which they may enter. Implementation of a Parole Process for Nicaraguans, 88 Fed. Reg. 1255, 1255 (Jan. 9, 2023). The parole period is for 2 years and intended to allow Nicaraguan immigrants to seek humanitarian relief or other immigration benefits to which they may be eligible. *Id.* at 1256. "Those who are not granted asylum or any other immigration benefit during this two-year parole period generally will need to depart the United States prior to the expiration of their authorized parole period or will be placed in removal proceedings after the period of parole expires." *Id.*
