



5. The car the three women were in at the time of their arrest was left on the street. The windows were shattered. I learned later that all three women were arrested while guns were pointed at them.

6. At about 10:00 p.m. the same evening, the teacher called me. She stated that she was at the Whipple Federal Building in St. Paul. She was with the other two women, including Ms. Perez. All three were shackled by their wrists and their feet. They were all bleeding from the broken car glass and still had glass sticking into their bodies. They had not gotten any medical care, food or water. They were not told the reason they were detained. ICE agents told them to have their children brought to the Whipple building, but the women were scared.

7. At about 11:00 p.m., the teacher called me again. She was scared. The agents told her and Ms. Perez they should bring her kids to the Whipple building before they were moved to Texas. In the background I could hear people crying and yelling.

8. At about 10:00 a.m. the next day, the teacher called me again. She was still restrained at her hands and feet and was bleeding from the restraints. She had not received any food, water or medical attention. She and the other women had no room to lie down during the night and no bedding or blankets. They were hungry, thirsty, scared, cold, and in pain.

9. The teacher called me again at about 3:00 p.m. the same day, on Sunday, February 1, 2026. She told me that the conditions had not changed. All three women, including Ms. Perez, had glass all over them still from the car windows. They had still not received any food or water.

10. On February 3, 2026, Ms. Perez called me herself. She was still at the Whipple Building in St. Paul. She had received nothing to eat since she got there (more than 60 hours earlier) except two apples. She still had glass embedded in her skin. She was wearing the same clothes as when she was arrested. She had not been able to shower. She said she was very cold and very hungry.

11. I spoke to Ms. Perez again on February 9, 2026. She had been transferred to the Crow Wing County Jail in Brainerd, Minnesota. She was very sick with influenza and had been placed in isolation. She was not given sufficient water or food. I could hear her coughing throughout the call and she said her head and body ached badly. She had asked for medication several times but had not at this point been given any.

12. I have spoken to Ms. Perez again four times over Feb 10-Feb 11. She had still not received the water or cough drops we had ordered, had received very little medical care, and was still in solitary confinement due to her illness. She stated that her cough had worsened and she had been given no information on what would be happening.

14. Attached to this declaration as Exhibit 3 is a true and accurate copy of a letter written by Father Espinel, the pastor at the church Ms. Perez attends.
